The Inspired Word of God

Chapter 5

Some might view this chapter as overkill but really, it has great significance! How can we view anything that confirms the Word of God as overkill? This segment will focus on the over 150+ **patterns of "Sevens"** in the Bible. These are those patterns that require readers to plow the text of Scripture. They are <u>less visible and often hidden in plain sight</u> rather than the actual number or the word itself.

Represents perfection, and is the sign of God, divine worship, completions, obedience, and rest. The "prince" of Bible numbers, it is used over 668X times, including its derivatives (e.g., seventh, sevens). -(See Genesis 2:1–4, Psalm 119:164, and Exodus 20:8–11 for just a few of the examples.) Seven is all of the above but I believe more so that it is God's Covenantal Number.

The word "seven" is also the most common in biblical prophecy, occurring 54 times in Revelation alone. In Revelation there are seven churches, seven spirits, seven golden candlesticks, seven stars, seven lamps, seven seals, seven horns, seven eyes, seven angels, seven trumpets, seven thunders, seven thousand slain in a great earthquake, seven heads, seven crowns, seven last plagues, seven golden vials, seven mountains, and seven kings.

One of the first "seven" themes is found in the book of Genesis where the book of beginnings anticipates all false philosphies:

Atheism	Genesis says the world was created by God.
Pantheism	Genesis says God is transcendent and distinguishable.
Polytheism	Genesis says there is One God.
Materialism	Genesis says that matter had a beginning.
Humanism	Genesis says that God, not man, is the ultimate reality.
Evolutionism	Genesis says "God created".
Uniformism	Genesis says God intervenes in His creation.

Another "Seven" found in Genesis 12:1-3 is the "Seven" <u>I Will's</u> spoken to Abraham by God in the Abrahamic Covenant:

- And I will make of thee a great nation,
- And I will bless thee,
- And make thy name great;
- And thou shalt be a blessing:
- And I will bless them that bless thee,
- And curse him that curseth thee:
- And in thee shall all families of the earth be blessed.

One of the deceptive concepts is how Scripture has been misrepresented by those who want to treat the Bible simply as allegory or by spiritualizing Scripture thereby tending to forget God's dealings with man through epochs or administrations. Roughly 90% of the Christian world hold to this method of understanding the Bible. Another 10% view the Bible as being literal and historical first. God defined it as The "Seven" Dispensations:

Many people errantly dismiss the fact that the Bible speaks of the rebuilding of a 3rd Jewish Temple with the Antichrist's approval during the first half of the Great Tribulation, and then the last chapters of Ezekiel 40-43 speak of the matter of a 4th and final Temple of the Lord, referred to as the Millennial Kingdom Temple where Christ Jesus rules and reigns from for 1,000 years. This is a major error on the part of Amillennialism or Covenant/Reformed theology, which fails to make a distinction the Bible makes concerning Israel and the Church. Amillennialism has been in the majority and the most dominant theology since the time of Roman Catholicism when it was adopted by the bishop of Hippo, St. Augustine. Rome adopted "Supersessionism" or what is commonly known as "Replacement" theology in which the belief is the church replaced Israel. This is a heresy straight from the pit of Hell!

The "Sevens" of God can also be observed in the things of Nature. It appears that the physics and chemistry of nature are structured on just such a base system. An example that almost everyone can relate to is Music. All the songs you hear on the radio are based on a musical system of just "seven" major notes:



Notice that the "seven" notes repeat, with the eighth key a higher or lower octave of the first as you go up (or down) the keyboard. All other minor notes, sharps and flats, fit within the structure of the basic "seven" musical notes.

Metamorphosis of a butterfly emulates life cycles:

The cycle of wholeness is impressed into a complete cycle of "seven". We can give each stage a different name and describe it from many viewpoints. The core characteristics of each stage can be found everywhere in nature from a butterfly's metamorphosis to the life cycles of the growing human being. From Greek myth to modern gravity theories we find these mysterious "seven" cycles for those with 'eyes to see.'

Take for example the life cycle of a monarch butterfly, a most wondrous creation of nature filled with wisdom and mystery. The butterfly is the best example of metamorphosis and has great secrets to share about the present evolution of humanity.

For instance, in biology the butterfly egg starts as a "dot" on a leaf. A simple place holder, like a dot or point, filled with the secrets of becomingness. Often, "seven" raised lines cross the top of the egg, perhaps a sign of what is to come. As a spiritual exercise, we might imagine looking at the butterfly as a pattern of "seven" in nature. The egg represents zero dimensions – just a place holder. The egg hatches and the new caterpillar eats the remains of its own egg and start moving forward in linear fashion, eating voraciously in "one direction". Its form is now "one dimensional" as it moves forward in one direction.

After a while, the caterpillar finds the underside of a leaf to attach its back legs to while it begins to spin its thread into a cocoon. The cocoon resembles a crude sphere into which the butterfly encloses itself, creating the two dimensional experience of "inner and outer."

The tomb of the chrysalis becomes a womb to the next stage of its development. Its new home, the sac of the chrysalis, represents the beginning stage of a higher dimensional chrysalis of potential. The one dimensional caterpillar passes into the two dimensional cocoon and then into the three dimensional butterfly that commands the three dimensions of space.

The caterpillar dies and is reborn as a butterfly in the process of being birthed into the third dimension. This cycle of birth (caterpillar) – rebirth (butterfly) – procreation (egg) - death repeats itself through four generations of the butterfly cycle.

The Seven Mysteries of the Bible

In 1 Corinthians 4:1-2 we are told, "Let a man so account of us as of the ministers of Christ, and stewards of the mysteries of God. Moreover it is required in stewards, that a man be found faithful." A steward then is somebody that is given something valuable to take care of, and he is supposed to take care of it for his master. Not only that, a steward is to be "faithful" because he has goods delivered to him that don't belong to him. Such is every one of us who is given stewardship of God's money. We understand about God giving us money and use it as the Lord would have us to. But here we are talking about a different kind of stewardship. We are talking about the "mysteries of God." We are talking about stewardship over something that has been given for the purpose of teaching to others.

What are these mysteries? There are **"seven"** of them in the Bible and they are committed to preachers to teach to others. I will briefly describe them as follows:

1. The Mystery of **Godliness**

1st Timothy 3:16: "And without controversy great is the mystery of godliness: God was manifest in the flesh, justified in the Spirit, seen of angels, preached unto the Gentiles, believed on in the world, received up into glory".

This verse is the greatest verse in the Bible on the Deity of Jesus Christ. If you don't have a King James Bible you won't be able to find this mystery defined. All other bibles change this verse in order to take away the deity of Christ. They change the phrase "...God was

manifest in the flesh..." to something else. God being "manifest in the flesh" means that God showed up as a baby and later grew up to be a man. It cannot be explained how He did this. Why? Because how it happened is a mystery. He came down to this earth as a baby, and a woman took care of Him, just like every other baby. He experienced every facet or aspect of growing up as a human male.

2. The Mystery of the Indwelling Christ

Colossians 1:27: "To whom God would make known what is the riches of the glory of this mystery among the Gentiles; which is Christ in you, the hope of glory:"

Paul says, "This mystery among the Gentiles; which is Christ in you, the hope of glory." This means the "mystery" is that Jesus Christ is inside the saved man. It can't be explained how, but if you are saved, then "Christ" is "in you, the hope of glory". It can't be explained how a sinless, perfect Savior would stoop down to come in and dwell inside a wicked, sinful vessel. Not only that, it can't be explained how Jesus could be in a vast multitude of saved people all at the same time. There aren't many individual Jesus'. There is one Jesus and he dwells within each believer. This is a mystery and can't be explained how it happens. It is the mystery of the indwelling Christ.

3. The Mystery of the Body of Christ

Ephesians 5:30-32: "For we are members of His body, of His flesh, and of His bones. For this cause shall a man leave his father and mother, and shall be joined unto his wife, and they two shall be one flesh. This is a great mystery: but I speak concerning Christ and the church."

The Bride of Christ in this age is espoused to one husband so it can be presented a chaste virgin to Christ -(2nd Corinthians 11:2). **This means that everyone who is a believer is espoused to the same person: Christ.** All men and women wind up married to Christ as one unit. How can you explain it? It can't be explained. It's a mystery. As far as the spirit is concerned, we are joined to Him right now -(1st Corinthians 6:17). The marriage has already taken place, but as far as the body is concerned the marriage hasn't taken place. Our physical bodies are down here and His is up there -(2nd Corinthians 5:6-8). It can't be explained. We are supposed to believe it. Paul said, "This is a great mystery". -(Ephesians 5:32).

4. The Restoration of Israel

Romans 11:25: "For I would not, brethren, that ye should be ignorant of this mystery, lest ye should be wise in your own conceits; that blindness in part is happened to Israel, until the fullness of the Gentiles be come in".

This mystery deals with the restoration of Israel. The mystery is that God is not through with Israel. And even though God may look like He's through with Israel, He's not! Someday God is going to take the Jews and bring them back to Israel (He did that in 1948), and after the Jews have been reduced down to about four or five hundred people, God is going to get them all saved in the Tribulation and convert them so that they believe and accept Jesus Christ as


their Lord and Savior. That's the mystery of the believing remnant of Israel which is going to turn to God. The 144,000 sealed Jews we find in Revelation Chapter 7 are "gathered" or "taken" by the angels into the presence of the Lord. This suggests a specific Rapture of the 144,000 Jewish sealed evangelists. Romans 11:28-29 says that "as concerning the gospel, they are enemies for your sakes: but as touching the election, they are beloved for the fathers' sakes. For the gifts and calling of God are without repentance." This means that we should love the Jews. Yes, granted, some Jews out in the world are unlovable characters. It doesn't matter what you think of them, you've got to love Israel and take care of it. If you don't, the Lord will deal with you. In Christ "There is neither Jew nor Greek" -(Galatians 3:28). When a Jew gets converted, he's no longer a "Jew." He's a Christian. I know that many Messianic Jews will dispute this but their argument is with the Apostle Paul not me.

5. The Mystery of Babylon the Great

Revelation 17:5: "And upon her forehead was a name written, MYSTERY, BABYLON THE GREAT, THE MOTHER OF HARLOTS AND ABOMINATIONS OF THE EARTH".

Revelation 17:18: "And the woman which thou sawest is that great city, which reigneth over the kings of the earth."

She is a woman out in the wilderness seated on a beast. The beast has **"seven"** heads and ten horns. This is a "mystery." It is something you're supposed to believe, but you can't explain. I deal with this topic in my series "<u>The Beast Empire</u>". This is laid out in the 1972 Club of Rome map below:



The Ten Kingdoms = the ten regions originated with the Club of Rome "think tank", and was established by the United Nations. The Club of Rome was given the task of uniting Europe,

and dividing the world into manageable blocks. A third task was to reduce the world's population. Here's a map of the world, divided into the ten economic regions, which the United Nations and the Club of Rome call "The Ten Kingdoms". From Gary Kah's book 'En Route to Global Occupation', page 40: "The Club of Rome had its beginnings in April of 1968. The Club of Rome has been charged with the task of overseeing the regionalization and unification of the entire world; the Club could therefore be said to be one step above the Bilderbergers in the one world hierarchy. On September 13, 1973, the Club released one such report entitled "Regionalized and Adaptive Model of the Global World System"...The document reveals that the Club has divided the world into ten political and economic regions, which it refers to as "kingdoms". As the ten kingdoms/regions come together even more in preparation for the reign of the world ruler, we will see the regionalizing of money, then a globalization of monetary exchange or the "cashless society". -(Revelation 13). Regarding the world and its division into economic regions: Here are the countries for each region: Since this map was drawn in 1973, the first region also includes Mexico. 1. NAFTA (America, Canada and Mexico) 2. The E.U. – countries of the European Union, Western Europe as a whole 3. Japan 4. Australia, New Zealand, South Africa 5. Eastern Europe, Pakistan, Afghanistan, Russia and the former countries of the Soviet Union 6. Central and South America, Cuba and Caribbean Islands 7. The Middle East and North Africa 8. The rest of Africa, except South Africa 9. South and Southeast Asia, including India 10. China (Mongolia is now included with China) the islands of the seas, for the most part, fit in with the closest region.

The woman is a city that reigns over the kings of the earth. She has a golden cup in her hand full of abominations -(Revelations 17:4). And, she is arrayed in purple and scarlet. There is only one city that is built on "seven" mountains (hills) -(vs. 9), that reigns over the kings of the earth, whose symbol is a golden cup: ROME! The Lord said that this city was a whore -(vs. 1). She's a prostitute who sells herself for money. She has such influence that she runs the kings of this earth. She will sell out what she believes and what she professes in order to get along with the world. She'll let her own priests be killed in Africa if she can get control of Africa. She might even elect a black pope.

6. Mystery of Iniquity

2nd Thessalonians 2:3-8: "Let no man deceive you by any means: for that day shall not come, except there come a falling away first, and that man of sin be revealed, the son of perdition; Who opposeth and exalteth himself above all that is called God, or that is worshipped; so that he as God sitteth in the temple of God, shewing himself that he is God. Remember ye not, that, when I was yet with you, I told you these things? And now ye know what withholdeth that he might be revealed in his time. For the mystery of iniquity doth already work: only he who now letteth will let, until he be taken out of the way. And then shall that Wicked be revealed, whom the Lord shall consume with the spirit of his mouth, and shall destroy with the brightness of his coming:"

The mystery of iniquity is the mystery of the Antichrist. His number is **666**. He has a sign: it's a kiss. He has a salute: its two fingers. He has a letter: it's an X. And he has a name, a religion,

a face, and a mark. There's more information in the Bible on him than there is on any other man in the Bible outside of Jesus Christ Himself. He's the Antichrist.


7. The Rapture

1st Corinthians 15:51-55: "Behold, I shew you a mystery; We shall not all sleep, but we shall all be changed, In a moment, in the twinkling of an eye, at the last trump: for the trumpet shall sound, and the dead shall be raised incorruptible, and we shall be changed. For this corruptible must put on incorruption, and this mortal must put on immortality. So when this corruptible shall have put on incorruption, and this mortal shall have put on immortality, then shall be brought to pass the saying that is written, Death is swallowed up in victory. O death, where is thy sting? O grave, where is thy victory?"

The final mystery is the Rapture. It is the disappearance of the Body of Christ ("Born-Again" Christians) in a moment, in the twinkling of an eye. There are two kinds of people. Those who are alive when the Lord comes that are to be caught up without dying. Those that are dead who will be pulled up out of the ground. If you're a living mortal, you'll be caught up without dying and then put on immortality. If you're dead and buried when the Lord comes back, then you're down in the ground rotting and you're corruptible, and you come out of the grave and put on incorruption. The ones that are buried can't stay in the ground. The living man goes up without dying; and the dead man goes up, and the grave can't keep him down.

The "seven" Words of Jesus Pronounced on the Cross:

- 1. "My God, my God, why have you forsaken Me?" (Matthew 27:46)
- 2. "In truth I tell you, today you will be with Me in paradise to the good thief." -(Luke 23:43)
- 3. "Father, into your hands I commit My spirit." -(Luke 23:46)
- 4. "Father, forgive them; they do not know what they are doing." -(Luke 23:34)
- 5. "Woman, this is your son, (to John): This is your mother." -(John 19:26)
- 6. "I am thirsty." -(John 19:28)
- 7. "It is fulfilled." -(John 19:30)

All things of nature, be they plasma, matter, energy, time or space, were designed and ordained by the Lord God. Therefore, rest assured that our Holy Bible is the infallible Master Textbook of true science: Scientists can only elaborate on the observed details.

"For by Him were all things created, that are in heaven, and that are in earth, visible and invisible, whether [they be] thrones, or dominions, or principalities, or powers: all things were created by Him, and for Him: And He is before all things, and by Him all things consist."



•	5:4	Has faith that overcomes the world

There are "seven" Reasons why 1st John was Written:

5:18

1:3	fellowship with the Father, with His Son Jesus Christ, and also with the apostles.
1:4	provides true and lasting joy for the human heart through proper relationship with the Lord.
2:1	gives us God's perfect standard for His people, and His gracious provision in the event of failure.
2:13-17	a reminder to all levels of Christian maturity – to avoid love of the world by emphasizing the importance of constantly feeding on the Bible and having it ready to repel the attacks of Satan.
2:21-24	to confirm born-again believers in the truth and to remind them that no lie is of the truth. The very basis of the lie is to deny the deity of the Lord Jesus and this denies the Father also.
2:26-27	to the young believers concerning the false teachers by way of warning. Once the Holy Spirit is received, He will never be taken away. It means that the Christian does not need any teaching apart from what is found in the Word of God as to the truth of God.
5:13	those who believe in the name of the Son of God may know that they have eternal life.

There are "seven" <u>Tests of Christian Genuiness</u> in 1st John:

1:6	There can be no hiding of sin. Light and darkness cannot exist in a person's life at the same time.
1:8	Conversion does not mean the eradication of the sin nature. Rather it means the implanting of the new, divine nature, with power to live victoriously over indwelling sin.
1:10	We must be absolutely honest about our condition, and that there should be no hypocrisy or hiding of what we really are.
2:4	John is looking at the over-all tenor of a person's life. If someone says he knows God but does not keep His commandments, then it is clear that he is not telling the truth.
2:22	John is careful to point out that to deny the deity of the Lord Jesus is to deny the Father also. Some people like to believe that they worship God, but they do not want to have anything to do with the Lord Jesus Christ. The apostle says, "He is

	antichrist who denies the Father and the Son."
4:20	John argues the impossibility of loving God whom we have not seen if we do not love our brothers whom we have seen.
5:10	When a man does accept His testimony concerning His Son, God seals the truth by giving the man the witness of the Spirit in himself. On the other hand, if a man disbelieves God, he makes Him a liar; because he has not believed the testimony that God has given of His Son. People think they can accept or reject God's testimony concerning Christ, but John would have them know that to reject it is to accuse God of dishonesty.

There are "seven" Tests of Honesty and Reality in 1st John:

0	
1:6	A man who says he has fellowship with Him and habitually walks in darkness was never saved at all.
1:8	To deny that we have a sinful nature means self-deception and untruthfulness.
1:10	We must not deny that we have committed acts of sin. It is a flat contradiction of His word, and a complete denial of the reason the Lord Jesus came to suffer, bleed, and die.
2:6	Whoever says he abides in Him should walk just as the Lord Jesus walked. His life, as set forth in the Gospels, is our pattern and guide. It is not a life which we can live in our own strength or energy, but is only possible in the power of the Holy Spirit.
2:9	If one professes to be a Christian and yet hates those who are truly Christians, it is a sure sign that such a one is in darkness until now. This latter expression shows that it is not a case of backsliding that is in view. The man continues to be what he always was, namely, unsaved.
4:20	John emphasizes the futility of professing to love God while at the same time hating one's brother. As spokes get nearer to the center of the wheel, so they get nearer to one another. Thus, as we get closer to the Lord, the more we will love our fellow believers.
5:10	He that believeth on the Son of God hath the witness in himself: he that believeth not God hath made him a liar; because he believeth not the record that God gave of his Son.

The New Testament uses the term "Tax Collector" a total of 21X (7 x 3) times. $\tau \epsilon \lambda \acute{\omega} \nu \eta \varsigma$ ("telones"). telones refers to those who worked for the Roman government levying taxes (the KJV term is "publican"). In the New Testament, the Jews despised such people for two reasons.

- 1. They had a reputation for corruption, often levying taxes beyond what was required, thereby hoping to fill their own pockets -(Luke 3:12).
- 2. The *"telones"* for Jewish society were themselves Jews who had "sold out" to the Gentile Roman government and thus worked against their own people.

The New Testament uses the expression "Teacher of the Law" 63X (7 x 9) times. The Greek word $\gamma \rho \alpha \mu \mu \alpha \tau \epsilon \dot{\nu} \varsigma$ ("grammateus"), A grammateus was a "teacher of the law, an expert in legal issues, a scribe." We get our English word grammar from this Greek word.

The Hebrew word for "spell" הֶּבֶּוֹל (chever) is found "seven" times in the King James Bible. These are located in Deuteronomy 18:11; Psalm 58:5; Proverbs 21:9; 25:24; Isaiah 47:9; 47:12; and Hosea 6:9. This is a strange word that is translated "charming", "enchantment", and "shared with" in English. It has a half-dozen synonyms. This noun, derived from the verb "chāvar", "to unite" or "to join" has two basic meanings in the Old Testament. The first is "association." This use of the noun is found in Proverbs 21:9; 25:24; and Hosea 6:9. The second is "spell" or "incantation" and is found in Deuteronomy 18:11; Psalms 58:5; and Isaiah 47:9, 12.

The reason I am singling out this word is to point out that when searching for the "Heptadic" Design Feature, patterns of "seven" or multiples of "seven" they have to be searched for at different levels of the King James Bible. If one searched only the English rendering, it would be missed entirely since it is translated three or four ways in English. Only the use of a Hebrew or Greek concordance or lexicon reveals if it occurs at the level of Greek or Hebrew in this case. Another factor is that not all concordances or lexicons are of the same quality of scholarship. Just beware of my point when you face critics who want to argue against the "Heptadic" Design Feature in the King James Bible.

Not all theologians or Bible scholars recognize the "Heptadic" Design Feature, most are unfamiliar with it, and many prefer to ignore it entirely or attack it at the level of the early manuscripts. This is true of the liberal scholars who have agendas that require rejecting God's Signature of Self-Authentication. Bart D. Ehrman, at the University of North Carolina – Chapel Hill, he is the primary liberal "attack dog" when it comes to textual criticism. Bart Ehrman was a "born again" fundamentalist as a teenager. Schooled at Moody Bible Institute, Wheaton College, he later earned his M.A. and Ph.D. at Princeton Theological Seminary where he became the "flaming" liberal scholar he is today. Few conservative theologians are alums of Princeton Theological Seminary, which today has been a haven for liberalism since the protégé's of Julius Wellhausen dominated the world of theology since the end of the 19th century. Until Julius Wellhausen came along in the 19th century with his liberalism and textual criticism, the Christian world did not debate the truth of the Bible. Jullian Wellhausen's protégé's began to treat the Bible like a real book that could contain historical anachronisms and inconsistencies. The Bible was not simply inerrant scripture that needed to be harmonized.

This new "enlightened" approach to reading the Bible produced a German school of interpretation in the theology departments of Protestant universities. The most influential member of this intellectual school was the German scholar Julius Wellhausen. In 1878, Wellhausen synthesized previous scholarly discoveries in Higher Criticism through the publication of his highly influential book 'Prolegomena to the History of Ancient Israel'. Ultimately, Wellhausen's work did for Biblical scholarship what Darwin's 'Origin of the Species' accomplished for natural science. As Darwin's concept of evolutionary adaptation through

natural selection has become central to modern evolutionary theory, so Wellhausen's work on historical criticism provides the foundation for modern scholarly assessments of the Bible.

Only the science of mathematics has rescued the existence of the "Heptadic" Design Feature from the likes of Bart D. Ehrman. Dr. Ivan Panin, and many Hebrew scholars have revived our understanding of how God left us His Self-Authenticating signature on the Masoretic Hebrew and Greek Textus-Receptus manuscripts that confirm the King James Version Bible as God's Holy Word.
